Exercises (18 pts)

1. Textbook : Sec. 2.2, ex. 19, 30. (**3+3 pts**)
 2. *Introduction to mathematical arguments* : p.12 ex. 1, 3 and p.21 ex. 2. (**6+3+3 pts**)
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For those of you who do not have the textbook yet, sec. 2.2 ex. 19 and 30 are respectively :

1. What is wrong with the following "proof" that every matrix with at least two rows is row equivalent to a matrix with a zero row ?

Perform $R_2 \leftarrow R_2 + R_1$ and $R_1 \leftarrow R_1 + R_2$. Now rows 1 and 2 are identical.
Now perform $R_2 \leftarrow R_2 - R_1$ to obtain a row of zeros in the second row.

2. Solve the following system using either Gaussian (row echelon form) or Gauss-Jordan (reduced row echelon form) elimination :

$$\begin{cases} -x_1 + 3x_2 - 2x_3 + 4x_4 = 0 \\ 2x_1 - 6x_2 + x_3 - 2x_4 = -3 \\ x_1 - 3x_2 + 4x_3 - 8x_4 = 2 \end{cases}$$
